Pastor's Note

Trick or Treat? The kids are practicing and deciding what costumes they will wear. The stores are full of Halloween costumes and candy. Crowded around the Halloween decorations are pretty fall wreathes and signs that say, "Grateful, Thankful, Blessed." Everywhere we look, we are reminded that we are changing seasons. Many people say Fall is their favorite season. And for good reason. We get a break from the often-brutal heat of summer. We are able to watch the leaves change into the beautiful array of colors that nature grants them each year. Families return to the routine of school and practices and games on the weekends. There is so much to love about this time of the year.

Unfortunately, instead of enjoying this time of the year, we start focusing on what comes after Fall: Winter. Instead of enjoying the cooler temps, we hear people say things like, "You better enjoy this weather now. Before you know it, there will be snow on the ground." Sadly, many of us do this in areas of other than just the seasons. Instead of enjoying the moment, we start thinking about what is coming up ahead.

This pattern of worrying about what may or may not happen in the future must be part of human nature, because Jesus addressed it when he said to his followers:

²² "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat, or about your body, what you will wear. ²³ For life is more than food and the body more than clothing. ²⁴ Consider the ravens: they neither sow nor reap, they have neither storehouse nor barn, and yet God feeds them. Of how much more value are you than the birds! ²⁵ And which of you by worrying can add a single hour to your span of life? ²⁶ If then you are not able to do so small a thing as that, why do you worry about the rest? ²⁷ Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. ²⁸ But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, how much more will he clothe you, you of little faith! ²⁹ And do not keep seeking what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not keep worrying. ³⁰ For it is the nations of the world that seek all these things, and your Father knows that you need them. ³¹ Instead, seek his kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well."

Instead of worrying about what will come after Fall, let's live in present. Instead of worrying about what is ahead of us, God has given us something to focus on: God's Kingdom. When we are focused on the kingdom, instead of ourselves, we are able to recognize and enjoy the gifts God has given and trust in him for the future and the present.

There was a co sleeper, potty seat, stuffed animals and lots of baby blankets for Baby Steps Society and books for the Ona Emergency Children's Shelter. All of these are operated by WVCHS.

Shout Out to Karen Albers who has donated over 500 hats this year alone and is still crocheting! So far this year Karen's hats have been donated to **Harmony House** and packed in shoeboxes. as colder weather approaches, we have so many more organizations that would love to have these!



The Exorcism in Gerasa

Lesson Two of our "Sacred Encounters" in our Presbyterian Women's Bible Study is entitled...The Exorcism in Gerasa. I know you may be asking yourself....what or where in the world is Gerasa? Actually, it's a city located east of the Sea of Galilee and the River Jordan. This was one of the scenes of a sighting where Jesus had released the demons from a man.



Wednesday Night Dinner: Dr. Terry Fenger



Dr. Terry Fenger joined the Department of Microbiology in the School of Medicine at Marshall University in 1979 with his research and teaching focus being Virology. Between 1979 and 2020 he taught second year medical students in areas of viral diseases, antiviral drugs and vaccines and virus replication. In 1992 he was approached by members of the WV State Police crime laboratory to provide instruction in molecular biology. This effort morphed into the developing and teaching of multiple courses which in 1995, became the basis for the Master Degree Program in Forensic Science at Marshall. This degree program now offers four areas of emphasis in forensic DNA technologies, forensic chemistry, crime scene investigation, and digital device forensics.

Terry retired as director and instructor of the Forensic Science Center in 2017. As of June 2023, Dr. Fenger came back to Marshall to serve as the Interim Executive Director for the Forensic Science Center while also teaching a course in molecular biology to forensic science students.

During October's Wednesday Night Dinner, Dr. Fenger will discuss the important roles vaccines have played in eliminating and reducing devastating diseases worldwide such as smallpox, polio, and measles. While also addressing, the different types of vaccines that have been developed and utilized over the last several decades specifically mRNA vaccines. mRNA vaccines are a game changer in preventing severe diseases caused by viruses and in this talk, Dr. Fenger will dispelled the misconceptions about this type of vaccine.

Dinner will include: Pork Chops, Smashed Potatoes, Green Beans, and Fried Apples






